

Mobilizing local believers is the best way to reach unreached people. The key to sharing the Gospel in unreached villages is to equip and energize the ministry of Christ-followers who live in nearby villages. In 2012, Reach A Village began empowering local Christian leaders to share the Gospel with those who have never heard, to nurture new believers and to start churches.

Today, Bob leads the Reach A Village team and local ministry partners around the world in reaching unreached villages with the truth of God's Word. Together, they want to finish the mission Jesus gave His disciples: to take the Good News to the ends of the earth so that every person in every village has the opportunity to have a relationship with Him.

The Lord has called many people to serve as part of this global ministry — our board members, team, and thousands of international partners. As you read this report, pray for the people featured on these pages.


GENERATIONS OF IMPACT



FROM KYIV TO BULGARIA

NIKI AND DENI'S 2022 JOURNEY



What if you were trying to leave a country when a military invasion began? That is what happened to Niki and Deni (left), Reach A Village's International Ministry Directors for Eurasia, on February 23, 2022. They were booked on a flight leaving Kyiv when the invasion of Ukraine started. Here is a glimpse of the terror they experienced as they returned home to Bulgaria.

—Wednesday, February 23

We arrived in Kyiv around noon, and local believers took us to the ministry office, a large house with a big warehouse. There we met Tanya, a refugee from Crimea, who takes care of the building and lives in the house.

After we had lunch, we spent hours talking with Misha, who leads the Ukrainian ministry. As you would expect, the topic of the current situation was repeatedly creeping into our conversation. "The pain of the local people is enormous," Misha said. "They do not show fear, but they have great anxiety about the unknown and feel intense resentment toward Russia. They will not surrender without a fight because of their solid national feeling and desire to defend themselves."

—Thursday, February 24

We were awakened by loud conversations at 5 a.m. At some point during this commotion, we heard two consecutive loud bangs.

At 6:30 a.m., Misha woke us up with the news that the war had begun. Bombings were happening in Kyiv, Odesa and other

cities in Ukraine. He asked us to get up, gather our luggage quickly, and go to the office.

Misha, Tanya, and her son, Bogdan, were waiting for us there. It was Bogdan's birthday. After breakfast, we read Psalms 91 and 17, encouraged each other, and prayed for God's guidance and protection. Later, we realized that martial law had already been declared and that the airspace over Kyiv was closed.

Getting around the country was extremely difficult. There were huge lines at the gas stations, grocery stores and pharmacies. We managed to contact the Bulgarian Embassy, but they were not yet ready with an evacuation plan. The day passed calmly for us, without any news from the Embassy.

We were accommodated in one of the office rooms, and Misha continued with his endless phone calls. There was still an internet connection and telephone connection. The office was prepared well for wartime like this. It was heated by wood, and they were well supplied, it had a generator for electricity and a separate water source. Misha had an electric car and had no worries about finding gas.

"We were grateful that our hosts remained so calm and mindful of us," Niki says. "The panic around was huge. Chaotic actions were taken, which complicated the situation, but Misha gave us confidence and peace. At noon, we even had a small party for Bogdan's birthday."

As evening came, we felt dreadful anticipation of new and heavier bombings on Kyiv. Before going to bed, we read Psalm 62 and prayed.

The night was calmer than expected. We went to sleep, fully dressed, on a couch.

—Saturday, February 25

We heard two consecutive explosions at 4:30 a.m. We jumped off the couch and went to our makeshift bomb shelter. No more explosions followed.

Tanya hadn't been able to sleep all night, and Bogdan was shaking with terror. We came out of the basement, had a cup of tea, and went back to bed.

As morning dawned, we learned that Russian troops were surrounding Kyiv, intending to capture the city. It became more and more urgent for us to find a way to leave. We decided to go to the Bulgarian Embassy in person.

Our team gathered again to pray. We were torn by the desire to get out of Kyiv as quickly as possible and the grief of leaving behind so many people dear to us.

"I don't even remember how it happened," Deni says. "But I spontaneously said that we wanted Tanya and Bogdan to go with us to Bulgaria so we could take care of them. Our hearts

If we had not seen it with our own eyes, we would not have believed that a mother with a small child could decide to leave her country, pack her belongings, and go with strangers to an unknown land in less than two minutes. Everyone present encouraged her, and in another five minutes, they were ready to go with us.

We took Tanya and Bogdan with us and got on the subway to the Embassy. "Subway stations were full of people sitting on the floor on blankets, wrapped in warm clothes, asleep or staring at their phones," Niki says. "As we rode, I watched the other people around me. Many traveled with large bags and suitcases. From time to time, I saw tears in their eyes or their foreheads furrowed."

At the Embassy, we learned that evacuation buses were traveling but had not even entered Ukraine yet. They were expected at 9 p.m., and the plan was to leave for Bulgaria the next day.

Because we were not allowed inside the Embassy, we decided to return to the ministry office. Two guards from the Embassy accompanied us to the metro station. When we arrived at the office, Misha's youngest daughter and his wife were already there.

Together, we made a plan to go to Moldova in Tanya's car. "We loaded the car with luggage and two cans of gasoline, ate quickly, and prayed again," Niki says. "While reading a psalm, Misha, who had kept his composure until then, burst into tears for the first time."

encountered endless traffic jams. These were due to checkpoints with many soldiers and barricades. After 10 hours of driving on bad roads with heavy traffic and countless checkpoints, we reached the border town of Mohyliv-Podylskyy. We spent the night in the car as we waited in line. That night of waiting turned into more than 24 hours.

Evgeni, a ministry leader from Moldova, let us know that there were significantly fewer cars at a nearby border checkpoint. We reached that checkpoint in an hour. Very young soldiers, fully armed, checked our documents and let us cross the bridge.

"We had just crossed the bridge when the soldiers started shouting, running and chasing a car in front of us," Niki says. "We were terrified. Several military vehicles sped past us. We waited like that without knowing what was going on for about half an hour."

Finally, the military let us continue on our way. After waiting for about four more hours, we finally crossed the Ukrainian border and entered Moldova.

"We witnessed young families with small children separating at the border," Deni says. "Mothers with their children crossed the border on foot while their husbands stayed in Ukraine because they were forbidden to leave the country. Full mobilization had already been announced for all men between the ages of 16 and 60."

Exhausted but also very happy, we went to Chisinau, where Evgeni was waiting for us at the ministry office.

Sunday, February 26

Our group had lunch together at a restaurant in the center of Chisinau. Refugees from Kyiv were sitting at the table next to us. Two of the refugees were Bulgarians.

After lunch, the four of us immediately set off for Romania. By the grace of God, there were very few cars at the border. After about two hours of waiting, we crossed into Romania.

"Although we really wanted to drive all night and return to Sofia as soon as possible, we felt tired and realized the risk would be too great," Niki says. "At 10 p.m., we found and booked two hotel rooms. The hotel was very nice, and it turned out that the price was half for Ukrainian refugees. We slept, had breakfast and set off again, hoping to get home that day."

Monday, February 27

At 3 p.m., we managed to cross the Romanian-Bulgarian border without any problems.

"On the way to Sofia, we sang and prayed to God with grateful hearts," Deni says. "He not only saved our lives and helped us escape unscathed, but also gave us the opportunity to take care of Tanya and Bogdan. She does not have a lot of money, all her relatives are in Russia, and she has never left Ukraine in her life."

Tanya has become a temporary resident of Bulgaria and is working with Niki and Deni. Bogdan is attending school in Sofia. "We hope that this horrible war will end soon," Niki says. "And we pray that Tanya and Bogdan will be able to return home."

A DESPERATE SITUATION

Since February 1, 2021, Myanmar — also known as Burma — has faced tragedies that most of us will never experience. The military junta assumed full control of the country. A shadow unity government formed in exile, and they encouraged citizens in every village to rise up with arms against the military. This action enraged the military. Bombings and bloodshed took place throughout the country.

Myanmar escaped the first waves of COVID-19, but people were caught off guard by more transmissible variants. The military hoarded vaccines and PPE. The remaining few hospitals had limited supplies and inadequate staffing. The military limited access to healthcare by welding shut hospital gates.

"Thousands have died, and we may never know the true number of deaths that occurred this past year," says one of Reach A Village's ministry partners. "The economy is in shambles, and war rages on in all parts of the country. Local believers have taken in thousands of villagers who are seeking shelter. They have also provided countless bags of rice, cooking oil and dried noodles and fish in unreachable villages as they shared the Gospel."

These local believers have endured their own suffering and persecution. Their vehicles were confiscated at checkpoints. Their families were interrogated as the military went from house to house. Their homes were destroyed when they refused to give their young adult males to military service.



Be encouraged. There is also positive news from Myanmar. Ministry leaders are meeting weekly with local believers by video conferencing, even with limited internet access. Believers were able to get 10,000 Bibles into the country. Through the work of the Holy Spirit during the past year, more than 200 house churches started; more than 100,000 people heard the Gospel; more than 10,000 people accepted Christ; and more than 6,000 new believers were baptized.



OUR MINISTRIES

STARTING NEW CHURCHES



ARTHUR—Armenia

"Fire was falling down on our heads from everywhere," says Arthur. "I was driving to the frontline of the war in my own car. Azerbaijan had attacked us again. My homeland was in danger, and my 19-year-old son was serving in the army. All the way, I was praying."

Arthur, a ministry partner, leads a group of Christ followers. The area where he lives is torn apart by military struggles for land. Lives are often lost in these battles, but he remains confident in the power of God to come against all the forces of evil.

That September 2020 battle lasted for 44 days. During that time, Arthur provided first aid to the wounded and drove the most seriously injured from different outposts to the hospital. "As I drove, I heard God tell me, 'All those with you will be saved,'" he

says. "Mines were blowing up in the roads, but we stayed safe." Later, Arthur visited some of the men he had taken to the hospital. One of them said that he was an atheist until the day he was wounded. "He told me that while he was lying in the dirt, almost unconscious, with shots being fired all around him, he saw a hand reaching out to him," Arthur says. "He heard a voice telling him that he would be saved. Now, this man is studying God's Word with us."

Arthur's son also miraculously survived this battle. "He told me that he and his friend were riding in a car on the frontline," Arthur says. "They heard a loud whistle that was coming toward the car. As soon as they jumped out, the car exploded. They survived, but they saw many of their friends killed."

Today, Arthur and other local believers are leading Bible studies in several villages. Some days, they travel 25 to 30 miles to meet with those who want to know more about Jesus. Arthur will be the first to tell you that they are serving with love to glorify God.

CHILDREN'S BIBLE MINISTRY



MADONNA—The Philippines

"I love teaching children about Jesus," says Madonna, one of Reach A Village's ministry partners and a Values Education teacher in the Philippines. "I want to help them live a different way than I did. I still remember how I used to live before I came to know the Lord."

Madonna married at a young age. She and her husband engaged in many vices and unhealthy activities. "Our lives were totally a mess," she says. "We fought a lot. The least little things would easily start a big fight between us."

Living a miserable and hopeless life, Madonna and her husband began to look for answers to their problems. But they looked in all the wrong places. Madonna started to gamble, and her husband

drank too much. Their problems grew larger than any resources they had.

Then, they met Paulita, one of Reach A Village's ministry partners. She invited them to join a Bible study group and search for answers in God's Word. "We came to know the Lord because Paulita ministered to us and cared for us," Madonna says. "God's mercy and grace totally changed our lives. We gave up drinking and gambling. We started living for Jesus."

Today, Madonna and her husband have a child of their own. They have more opportunities to make sure the next generation knows about Jesus and His love and care for them. "We are so grateful to God for this blessing and all the blessings He has given us," she says. "We serve Him with all our hearts. He continues to bless us with the good things that money can't buy."

DISCIPLING NEW BELIEVERS

Sharif* grew up in a Muslim household in a Muslim country. At age 10, however, he heard about Jesus from a group of Christians who came to his village. "I listened to them for a while, but I didn't understand anything," he says. "At age 19, I left my family and my country behind to work in Russia."

He recalls the feeling of freedom he had then. But that freedom soon resulted in bad decisions, and he served three years in prison. "I had no one else to blame for this trouble," he says. "So I blamed God and believed He had allowed all this to happen."

After his release, Sharif had to serve two more years in a prison camp. The Muslim influence was strong there, and he knew he had to make a choice about how he was going to live. He began to ask God to show him whether he should follow Jesus or Muhammad.

"About a month later, I went with Muslim friends to see a movie," Sharif says. "But that day, instead of a movie, there was a Christian gathering. I didn't understand anything I heard. But when they started singing a song I learned as a child, I felt like I was waking up from a dream. At that moment, God brought me back to Him."

God sent Oleg, a ministry partner, to visit Sharif in the camp. They began studying the Bible and praying together.

At the end of his sentence, Sharif was deported to his home country. He found a group of Christ followers and joined them. When he met Mayram, God confirmed that she was the woman he should marry. She already knew Jesus and prayed in His name.

With the help and support of his brothers and sisters in Christ, Sharif was able to open a café and a car wash. He and Mayram got married and just welcomed their third child into their family.

"Now, our whole family worships, prays and studies God's Word with other believers," Sharif says. "We serve the Lord together. I thank God for everything!"

As the Lord provides the tools for collecting and sharing such information, our ministry partners become better stewards of their time and resources. And more people are coming to know Jesus as their Lord and Savior.

In addition, Reach A Village continues to work with national partners in developing digital tools to assist them. As the internet becomes more available and accessible in unreached areas of the world, we have more ways to track local church planting teams and their activity as they reach into new areas. These digital tools manage many tasks related to fulfilling the Great Commission, including reaching everyone possible.



EXTRAORDINARY EVENTS IN THAILAND!



Thailand has at least 77,000 villages. Reaching all these villages with the Gospel may seem like a daunting task. The enthusiasm of local believers as they travel, preach, teach and invite others to follow Jesus Christ remains strong.

In a four-year period — with Reach A Village's help — local believers have reached 2,200 of those villages with the Gospel. During the past year, they achieved their goal of reaching every village in Phichit province.

On July 12, 2022, Reach A Village's Thai ministry partners once again set a new record for the single largest baptism in the nation's history! That day 1,588 people took this step of faith. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many of them had waited two years or more to be baptized.

Then, on August 1, another 585 people were baptized. Just two weeks later, 1,260 more people were baptized. Since these baptisms, our ministry partners are hearing numerous testimonies about freedom from addictions and miraculous healings.

Reach A Village team members from the U.S. — Ellis Craft, Erin Menke-Assam and Andrea Hildebrant — attended the August 1st baptisms. This was the first visit to Thailand for both Erin and Andrea. All three were given the honor of greeting these new followers of Jesus as they came out of the water.



"Seeing the ministry in action was wonderful," Andrea says. "The fellowship, team building and time of encouragement were very special for us."

While in Thailand, Ellis, Erin and Andrea also visited two house churches. They heard this inspiring testimony from a woman (inset) at one of the gatherings.



"Before I believed in Jesus, my granddaughter was sentenced to 30 years in prison," the woman said. "The pastor introduced me to Jesus and taught me how to pray for my granddaughter."

She prayed for Jesus to help her granddaughter and reduce the sentence. As she prayed, she also gathered with the local believers for worship, prayer and Bible study. Just five weeks after she began praying, her granddaughter called and told her, "I'm out of prison already." They are thanking God for this answer to her prayer. She is helping her granddaughter find a new life in Jesus.

Reach A Village's Thai ministry partners ask for our prayers. In 2023, their goal is to reach more than 1,000 villages, which would include all the villages in Phetchabun province.




TOTAL FUNDING SOURCES


